Health Update

Area residents don't have to travel outside of Henry County to receive outstanding orthopedic care close to home. Dr. Joseph Tansey, Board Certified Orthopedic Surgeon, has been providing orthopedic care at Henry County Health Center since last fall, and patients have been impressed with the personalized, high quality care they have received.

Stephanie Giberson, HCHC's Director of Communications, Patient Access & Health Information, and a patient of Dr.



Tansey, speaks highly of his expertise in orthopedics from her own personal experience. After injuring her shoulder two years ago, she realized that her work

as a personal trainer and other strenuous activities were beginning to take a toll. As her shoulder pain increased, Stephanie realized it was time to seek professional medical advice.

"I called for an appointment with Dr. Tansey and was seen that week. He was very personable. He ordered an MRI through HCHC's Radiology Department to determine the damage. He explained, without a lecture, that I had probably waited a little too long, and showed me clear images from the MRI as we discussed my options," explained Stephanie.

"Surgery was not his first recommendation. He felt that attempting some minor procedures like injections could be the answer. The pain was still the same after the first injection, and we determined surgery would benefit me most. He knew that I was very determined to get back to normal activity and my busy schedule, so he asked when surgery would work best for me. He did not tell me what would work for him; this was about me and I liked that coming from a physician."

SURGERY EXPERIENCE

Surgery can be a source of anxiety, but to be one of the first patients to experience HCHC's new Surgery Department was exciting for Stephanie. When she arrived for surgery, she was escorted to a private room. After being prepped for her procedure, her family was invited back to her room.

"Dr. Tansey explained what he planned to do. He asked if we had questions, and seeing there were none, said he would see me in surgery. My father said, 'Now THAT is a very personable surgeon. I think you are in good hands.' With my father's blessing, it seemed as though things were well on their way," stated Stephanie.

Following surgery, Dr. Tansey again checked on Stephanie and asked about her pain which was far less than what she felt prior to surgery. He said he was glad that he could help, again asking if there was anything she needed. He instructed for her to call if any problems arose, and if he didn't hear from her he would see her in a week for follow-up and removal of the stitches. He reiterated the importance of taking it easy so that her shoulder would heal.

"Dr. Tansey took the time to talk to me as a person; he did not herd me through to get to his next patient. He explained the procedure in terms I understood and I had a very positive experience," explained Tamara.

Jechnology at ACAC

Technology benefits patients and providers

Undergoing medical testing can be stressful for patients and families, and waiting for the test results is no easier. HCHC utilizes the latest technology to ensure that patients and physicians receive test results as quickly as possible to aid in diagnosis so treatment can begin sooner.

The Nuance Powerscribe 360 voice recognition dictation utilized by HCHC's Radiology Department is one such technology that gets test results in the hands of physicians more quickly. The dictation system is built upon software that recognizes the radiologist's voice as they are dictating (reading) exams. The software terminology utilized is general medical terminology and also specific terminology most commonly used in radiology reports.

"Once an exam has been ordered in HCHC's HIS/RIS system, it automatically places an order in the Nuance Powerscribe system. When the radiology staff has completed the exam and has marked it completed in our GE PACS Centricity system, this notifies the radiologist that the exam is ready for dictation. When the radiologist opens the images in GE PACS Centricity, it automatically opens the Nuance Powerscribe 360 dictation system and the radiologist dictates the exam," explained Todd Steenblock, HCHC Radiology Director.

"When the exam is complete, they can review the dictation on the screen verifying that it is correct and they sign the report as completed. The completed exam is routed back to HCHC's HIS/RIS system and sent via fax or connection directly into the ordering physician's electronic medical record."

Within the Nuance Powerscribe 360 is another software component that allows the radiologist to send critical test results at the time of dictation to the ordering physician ensuring that the results have been received and acknowledged by the referring doctor. The referring physician receives a fax or text message to call and listen to the radiologist's dictation. Once completed, they indicate that the message has been received. This closes the loop of critical results indicated in the report from the radiologist and received by the ordering clinician.

"HCHC implemented the dictation system in December 2010, and the benefits have been impressive. One of the most noticeable changes is the dramatic improvement in the turnaround time for reports. In the past when an exam was dictated, it went to a transcriptionist to type the report and was sent back to the radiologist to verify and sign. Due to the typical radiologist workflow, a report typed in the morning was not signed completed until mid to late afternoon. This limited the turnaround time for the report going from the radiologist back to the ordering physician to an average time of 4 to 6 hours," said Steenblock. "With the new system, the radiologist has lowered this turnaround time to a monthly average of 10 minutes, allowing the ordering physician to receive results sooner which enables them to follow-up with patients as needed."

Construction Update

Construction draws to a close HCHC CELEBRATES COMPLETION OF CONSTRUCTION PROJECT It is time for celebration at Henry County Health Center as the three phase construction project is close to completion.





In January 2014, the new Health Education Center and Laboratory opened. The Health Education Center (HEC) is larger, accommodates seating for more people, and will host educational classes, trainings and meetings. The Laboratory area is also larger, and features a separate check-in and waiting area and includes private lab draw stations for increased patient privacy. One room includes a table for patients to lie down for certain tests or if they become dizzy while having blood drawn.

The new registration area by the lobby and the Radiology receptionist area are also finished, allowing for enhanced patient privacy. The most recent finished areas are the new restrooms near the lobby, room improvements for outpatient cardiopulmonary services, added exam rooms for visiting specialists in Specialty Clinic, a new Women's Center in Radiology, and on-call sleep rooms.

PROJECT OVERVIEW

Phase One of this multi-phased facilities master plan began in November 2011 with the construction of a new Energy Center which was completed in summer 2012. The building provides the electrical, heating and cooling supply, allowing for future growth and sustainability of the health center. Phase Two included populating the Energy Center with equipment that provides the infrastructure to the organization.

Phase Three began in October 2012 with a ground breaking for the new Surgery Department which was completed in fall of 2013. This new department features 10 private, pre-operative, recovery rooms; two operating rooms plus an endoscopy suite; and a separate surgery waiting room. The Surgery Department plays an instrumental role in meeting the healthcare needs of future generations, and this project has expanded and improved the technology, comfort and privacy that patients receive.

"HCHC has a history of innovative, forward-thinking board members, and our current trustees have shown this same dedication to the delivery of quality healthcare when they committed to this project. I would like to thank our trustees, medical staff, associates, volunteers and contractors for their hard work and commitment to making this project a success," commented HCHC CEO Robb Gardner.

HCHC creates \$19.2 million impact on local economy

Henry County Health Center generates 349 jobs that add \$19,264,536 to Henry County's economy, according to the latest study by the Iowa Hospital Association. In addition, HCHC associates by themselves spend \$4,690,399 on retail sales and contribute \$281,424 in state sales tax revenue.

"Henry County Health Center benefits our county's economy in several ways. HCHC employs a large number of area residents, and the health center and our associates purchase goods and services from local businesses. All of this is significant and makes a positive impact on Henry County's economy," explained HCHC CEO Robb Gardner. "The medical and economic health of the county are impacted by changes in the health care sector. The health center plays a vital role in attracting new business, industry and residents to our area. It is crucial that we are able to provide high quality health care services to our area communities to keep our economy moving forward and to ultimately work toward HCHC's mission to enhance the health of individuals and our communities through high quality, effective and efficient services."

The IHA study examined the jobs, income, retail sales and sales tax produced by hospitals and the rest of the state's health care sector. The study found that Iowa hospitals directly employ 71,437 people and create another 57,792 jobs outside the hospital sector. As an income source, hospitals provide \$4.2 billion in salaries and benefits and generate another \$1.8 billion through other jobs that depend on hospitals.
